

Program Overview

The Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship provides a year of non-degree graduate-level study, coupled with leadership and professional development, in the United States for young and mid-career professionals from designated countries undergoing development or political transition. Humphrey Fellows are selected for their leadership potential and commitment to public service.

Distinguished **Humphrey Fellowship Program** (DHFP)

The intensive 18-day, invitation-only program offers executive and leadership development opportunities for senior-level professionals. Designed to strengthen participants' abilities and skills to develop sound policies and programs around critical global issues. The three main components:

- Executive-level seminar: Participants attend a customized seminar at a host organization.
- Strategic Networking Engagement: Participants are paired with a professional host or hosts who facilitates experiences that expose participants to a broad U.S. professional network and enhance their learning. Placements are geographically diverse across the U.S.
- Policy roundtable: Participants finish their program in Washington, D.C., where they continue to network and meet with U.S. Department of State
- Program themes have included leadership, media and disinformation, economic development, climate change, human rights and social justice, and the rights of indigenous people.



Since the program's inception in 2016, there have been 204 Distinguished Humphrey

Equip Fellows with the skills to lead in public service when returning to their home countries




Provide Fellows with a framework and resources to achieve professional goals




Provide exposure to U.S. counterparts from think tank, non-profit organization, the government, or corporate sector

Components of the RFP

- Due Date: September 15, 2024
- Qualifications and Capabilities (2 pages)
- Past Performance and Experience (2 pages)
- Implementation of Statement of Work (5 Pages)
 - Design and facilitate a one-week executive level academic workshop on Emerging Technology Policy or Combatting Illicit Drug Trafficking
 - Connect Participants (in groups of two or three) with a professional host or hosts for tailored, three-day Strategic Networking placement(s)
 - Provide a curated list of resources
- Cost Proposal and Budget

2025 DHFP Themes

Emerging Technology Policy

- Objective: This program should explore the strategies and skills needed to strengthen international collaboration, establish policy frameworks, and build robust regulatory infrastructure to respond to rapid technological advancement.
- Keywords: Digital solidarity, workforce development, global norms for ethical AI development and use, threat mitigation from bad actors, digital governance, economic prosperity and inclusion, human rights, democracy and rule of law, SDG, digital infrastructure, digital rights
- Nominees: Multidisciplinary policymakers, tech industry representatives, researchers/ethicists, lawyers, civil society representatives, multilateral organization representatives, experts in emerging tech workforce development

Illicit Drug Trafficking

- Objective: This program should explore the social, political, and economic implications of illegal drug trafficking by addressing key international challenges. These may include countering synthetic drug threats, improving prevention and drug demand reduction approaches, and developing effective enforcement and regulatory frameworks.
- Keywords: Countering synthetic drug threats, prevention and drug demand reduction approaches, effective enforcement and regulatory frameworks, emerging global trends in trafficking, international cooperation, interagency collaboration, economic and social factors that contribute to drug abuse and illicit trafficking
- Nominees: Law enforcement officials, policy makers, public health professionals, civil society representatives

FAQ

Q1: Can organizations apply to host multiple, different thematic DHFPs?

A1: Yes, but two separate proposals would be required, and it is highly unlikely that both proposals would be selected.

Q2: What are some expenses that should not be included in the Cost Proposal?

A2: Please use the provided budget template for your cost proposal. Costs that are disbursed directly to the Fellows include:

- Airfare
- Lodging
- International and Domestic Travel Allowance
- Meals and Incidentals
- · Emergency health benefits

Q3: Is cost share required?

A3: IIE encourages cost sharing, and the amount of identified cost share must be reasonable, allowable, and allocable to the program. For auditing purposes, the amount must be tracked and supporting documentation must be available upon request. Please note that, while encouraged, cost share is not mandatory. Cost share will be taken into consideration as a part of "cost proposal" evaluation.
